United Technologies



Created the Black Hawk helicopter and sells Comanche helicopters.

Halliburton



Everybody's favorite scorned Corporate Goliath, the company has had to think outside the box. It's moved outside the country, away from the press and, more importantly, away from U.S extradition laws.

As their site says: "Since its inception, Blackwater has trained over 50,000 military and law enforcement personnel and provided solutions to hundreds of satisfied customers."



Blackwater Employees have gone above and beyond what is expected of them, shooting when unprovoked. A "preliminary Iraqi report" filed by the Ministry of Interior "on a shooting involving an American diplomatic motorcade said [September 19, 2007,] that Blackwater security guards were not ambushed, as the company reported, but instead fired at a car when it did not heed a policeman's call to stop, killing a couple and their infant." The report, presented to the Iraqi cabinet seemed to contradict an account offered by Blackwater USA that the guards were responding to gunfire by militants.

Chevron
