Message from the Director

If you are keeping track of such things, you will notice in the following voting record that the 106th Congress didn't improve much in its second session, if at all.

While there was no "Democratic war" to skew the votes of traditional allies this time around (you will remember that in 1999 many members who would otherwise vote against military actions chose to support President Clinton's war in Yugoslavia), the records of our erstwhile friends continue to demonstrate the gradual drift, if not outright march, toward a more militarized foreign policy and federal budget.

President Clinton has personified the Democratic party's acceptance and/or promotion of high military budgets, new weapons systems, "cruise missile diplomacy," continued development of new nuclear weapons, and a militarily-defined foreign policy in relation to countries such as Iraq and Columbia. Preliminary indications are that the Bush Administration may be even worse than their predecessors on some of our issues while better on others. But we should make no mistake about it, the Clinton Administration was, by and large, terrible on our issues and all the more so because they enabled and encouraged many, otherwise sensible, members of Congress to follow their lead.

Thankfully, there is a core of members who believe what we believe and who are willing to vote and fight for it. We are particularly pleased to announce our 100% voters, in the column at right, and give special recognition and appreciation to the three who repeated their 100% records from last year—Reps. Barbara Lee, Cynthia McKinney, and Jesse Jackson, Jr. There are still others who didn't quite make the top tier—Reps. Kucinich, DeFazio, and Baldwin—who nonetheless continue to demonstrate their firm commitment to principles of peace and justice. May we, through our organizing, develop more like them in 2001.

The Peace Action Education Fund has several exciting programs planned for this coming year to mobilize the public around our issues, and we encourage you to use this voting record as part of your own work to educate the public and hold members of Congress accountable. With any luck, a Republican Administration may help some members rediscover the virtues of voting their conscience. Best wishes in your work to help them see the light, or failing that, feel the heat!

Key Senate Votes

(1) Star Wars Testing

Cochran, D-MS, motion to table (defeat) the Durbin, D-IL, amendment to the Fiscal 2001 Defense Authorization bill (S2549) that would require the Pentagon to test the national missile defense system against reasonable decoys and countermeasures that the system could encounter in a launch, and establish an independent panel to review the testing. Motion agreed to 52-48: R 52-3; D 0-45. July 13, 2000. Vote #178. **A vote no is a (+).**

(2) Nuclear Weapons Reductions

Warner, R-VA, amendment to the Kerrey, D-NE, amendment to the Fiscal 2001 Defense Authorization bill (S2549). The Warner amendment would replace the language of the Kerrey amendment with language that would require a nuclear overview study to be completed by December 2001, at the same time as the Defense Department's quadrennial review, before the president could waive current restrictions on dismantling strategic nuclear weapons systems. The Kerrey amendment would repeal the current restrictions. Adopted 51-47: R 50-3; D 1-44. (Subsequently, the Kerrey amendment, as amended was adopted by voice vote.) June 7, 2000. Vote #119. **A no vote is a (+).**

(3) Trident D-5 Submarine Missile Program

Allard, R-CO, motion to table (defeat) the Feingold, D-WI, amendment to the Fiscal 2001 Defense Authorization bill (S2549) that would terminate further production under the Trident II (D-5) submarine-launched missile program. The amendment would reduce funding in the bill for fiscal 2001 by \$462.7 million. Motion agreed to 81-18: R 53-2; D 28-16. July 13, 2000. Vote #177. **A vote no is a (+).**

(4) Nuclear Waste Storage

Passage of the bill (S1287) that would provide for the completion of siting and licensing activities for a permanent nuclear waste repository at Yucca Mountain, Nev. and establish a timetable for the development of the proposed site. Approximately ten percent of nuclear waste to be delivered to Yucca Mountain would come from nuclear weapons laboratories and related facilities. The waste would be trucked over U.S. highways, placing nearby residents and ecosystems at risk of contamination. Passed 64-34: R 52-2; D 12-32. Feb. 10, 2000. Vote #8. **A vote no is a (+).**

(5) Fiscal 2001 Defense Authorization

Passage of the bill to authorize \$309.8 billion for defense-related activities in fiscal 2001, a \$21.1 billion in-

crease from the fiscal 2000 authorized level, a 4.5 percent increase in real dollars (adjusted for inflation) from last year and an increase of \$4.6 billion from the President's request. Of this increase, 57% went to buying unrequested weapon systems. Personnel accounts were not increased and only 22% of the increase above the President's request went for operations and maintenance (readiness). The bill would require a nuclear overview study to be completed by December 2001, at the same time as the Defense Department's quadrennial review, before the president could waive current restrictions on dismantling strategic nuclear weapons systems. Passed 97-3: R 55-0; D 42-3. July 13, 2000. Vote #179. **A vote no is a (+).**

(6) Military Base Closures

McCain, R-AZ, amendment to the Fiscal 2001 Defense Authorization bill (S2549) that would authorize two rounds of military base closures and realignments, one in 2003 and another in 2005. Rejected 35-63: R 13-40; D 22-23. June 7, 2000. Vote #120. **A vote yes is a (+).**

(7) Corporate Jets

Stevens, R-AK, motion to table (defeat) the Boxer, D-CA, amendment to the Fiscal 2001 Defense Appropriations bill (HR4579) that would strike a section in the bill that allows the Army and Navy

secretaries to lease special aircraft. Motion agreed to 65-32: R 49-4; D 16-28. June 13, 2000. Vote #125. **A vote no is a (+).**

(8) Education Funding

Stevens, R-AK, motion to table (defeat) the Wellstone, D-MN, amendment to the Fiscal 2001 Defense Appropriations bill (HR4576) that would reduce Defense Department procurement spending by approximately \$1 billion and appropriate and additional \$922 million for Title 1 funding under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. Motion agreed to 83-15: R 54-0; D 29-15. June 13, 2000. Vote #126. **A vote no is a (+).**

(9) Military Aid to Colombia

Biden, D-DE, motion to table (defeat) the Wellstone, D-MN, amendment to the Fiscal 2001 Foreign Operations Appropriations bill that would reallocate \$225 million designated for military purposes in emergency funding for Colombia to funding for domestic substance abuse and treatment programs. Motion agreed to 89-11: R 53-2; D 36-9. June 21, 2000. Vote #138. **A vote no is a (+).**

Two members 'pair' when they both cannot be there and agree that they would vote opposite, hence canceling each others vote. Members 'announce' when they cannot be there but announce how they intend to vote. Peace Action Education Fund follows *Congressional Quarterly* in counting 'pairs' and 'announcements' as absentee non-votes counting against percentage ratings.

Key House Votes

(1) Trident D-5 Submarine Missile Program

Luther, D-MN, amendment to the Fiscal 2001 Defense Authorization bill that would end Trident II (D-5) submarine-launched ballistic missile production and terminate the program after fiscal 2002. Rejected 112-313: R 16-199; D 95-113; I 1-1. May 18, 2000. Vote #196. A vote yes is a (+).

(2) Fiscal 2001 Budget Resolution/Owens Substitute

Owens, D-NY, substitute amendment to the Fiscal 2001 Budget Resolution (H Con Res 290), on behalf of the Congressional Black Caucus that calls for cuts in defense spending, compared to the resolution, while increasing domestic spending on education, housing and economic development. Rejected 70-348: R 0-212; D 69-135; I 1-1. March 23, 2000. Vote #70. A vote yes is a (+).

(3) Fiscal 2001 Budget Resolution/DeFazio Substitute

DeFazio, D-OR, substitute amendment to the Fiscal 2001 Budget Resolution (H Con Res 290) on behalf of the Congressional Progressive Caucus that calls for cuts in defense spending, compared to the resolution, while increasing funding for education, health care and veterans. Rejected 61-351: R 0-211; D 60-139; I 1-1. March 23, 2000. Vote #71. A vote yes is a (+).

(4) One-Percent Reduction to the Military Budget

Frank, D-MA, amendment to the Fiscal 2001 Defense Authorization bill (HR4205) that would reduce the bill's total authorization by 1 percent. No cuts could be made in the operations and maintenance accounts or from personnel accounts. Rejected 88-331: R 14-201; D 73-129; I 1-1. May 18, 2000. Vote #194. A vote yes is a (+).

(5) Fiscal 2001 Defense Authorization

Passage of the bill (HR4205) that would authorize \$309.9 billion for defense programs, a \$21.2 billion increase from the fiscal 2000 authorized level, a 4.5 percent increase in real dollars (adjusted for inflation; 7% increase before inflation) from last year and an increase of \$4.6 billion from the President's request. Of this increase, 57% went to buying unrequested weapon systems. Personnel accounts were not increased and only 22% of the increase above the President's request went for operations and maintenance (readiness). The bill would provide \$62.3 billion for weapons procurement, \$39.3 billion for R&D, \$104.4 billion for operations and maintenance, \$8.4 billion for military construction and family housing and \$12.8 billion for the Energy Department. Passed 353-63: R 208-6; D 144-56; I 1-1. May 18, 2000. Vote #208. A vote no is a (+).

(6) Intelligence Appropriations Disclosure

Roemer, D-IN, amendment to the Fiscal 2001 Intelligence Authorization bill (HR4392) that would require the director of Central Intelligence to submit a report to Congress by Feb. 1 each year containing an unclassified statement of the aggregate appropriations for U.S. intelligence activities the previous fiscal year. Rejected 175-225: R 17-187; D 156-38; I 2-0. May 23, 2000. Vote #214. A vote yes is a (+).

(7) Military Aid to Colombia

Obey, D-WI, amendment to the Fiscal 2000 Supplemental Appropriations bill (HR3908) that would reduce the bill's Colombian anti-drug allotment by \$552 million. Rejected 186-239: R 58-157; D 127-81; I 1-1. March 29, 2000. Vote #84. A vote yes is a (+).

(8) School of the Americas

Moakley, D-MA, amendment to the Fiscal 2001 Defense Authorization bill (HR4205) that would close the Army's School of the Americas in Georgia and prohibit the establishment of a successor school for at least 10 months. A congressional task force would be charged with assessing the training of Latin American soldiers by the United States government and reporting

to Congress within six months. Rejected 204-214: R 48-167; D 154-47; I 2-0. May 18, 2000. Vote #204. A vote yes is a (+).

(9) Foreign Income Tax Exemption - Arms Sales Subsidy

Archer, R-TX, motion to suspend the rules and pass the bill (HR4986) that would exempt from federal taxes most income earned abroad and repeal portions of PL 98-369 that created foreign sales corporations (FSCs) at a cost of approximately \$1.5 billion over five years. The bill would increase the tax subsidy for arms exports providing military contractors with \$300 million per year in additional subsidies. Motion agreed to 316-72: R 197-6; D 118-65; I 1-1. A two-thirds majority of those present and voting (259 in this case) is required for passage under suspension of the rules. Nov. 14, 2000. Vote #597. A vote no is a (+).

(10) Middle East Violence

Gilman, R-NY, motion to suspend the rules and adopt the concurrent resolution (H Con Res 426) expressing Congress' solidarity with Israel and condemning the Palestinian leadership for encouraging the violence that has erupted in the Middle East. The resolution failed to also condemn violence perpetrated by Israeli forces. Motion agreed to 365-30: R 198-9; D 166-21; I 1-0. A two-thirds majority of those present and voting (in this case 264) is required for adoption under suspension of the rules. Oct. 25, 2000. Vote #549. A vote no is a (+).
