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Message from the Director

In 2002, Congress followed the President's lead and authorized an attack against Iraq, adopted a skyrocketed military budget (\$396.1 billion), and expanded the "war on terrorism." In the last year, the administration, along with many members of Congress, defined a new and frightening direction for the country by using the issue of terrorism to justify Star Wars, to monkey wrench the International Criminal Court, and to give military aid to dozens of countries, many with terrible human rights records.

However, unlike the strong pro-war votes immediately following the September 11, 2001 attacks, some members of Congress have successfully road-blocked parts of the President's radical, unilateralist agenda. After a concerted grassroots campaign, Congress set back plans for the development of new "usable" nuclear weapons, and many key votes show a deeper level of division on foreign policy issues than we saw in 2001.

While these signs are positive, much more needs to be done. The President's plans for war continue to flourish with Congressional consent. The President's foreign policy is alienating the US from its global allies, and is heading toward US military dominance around the globe. Ultimately, this direction will increase resentment of the United States and make the world less stable, and less safe.

Congress must assert a fundamentally different vision for US foreign policy.

The US needs an approach to foreign policy that is rooted in our core national values and that offers a greater prospect of security for the nation. To this end, the Peace Action Education Fund and its sister organization, Peace Action, have launched the Campaign for a New Foreign Policy. This campaign will build widespread support for a foreign policy based on the principles of human rights and democracy, reducing the threat of weapons of mass destruction, and international cooperation.

The decisions Congress makes this year will affect national and global security for decades to come. With all that at stake, certainly citizens will keep a close eye on this year's votes.

Key Senate Votes

(1) 2002 Supplemental Appropriations/ Passage

Passage of the bill that would provide \$31.5 billion in supplemental appropriations available for fiscal 2002, including \$14 billion for the Defense Department, plus funding for homeland security programs and post-Sept. 11 recovery efforts in New York. This legislation was a battleground for administration attempts to lift restrictions on the arms trade and military aid. Passed 71-22; R 26-20; D 44-2; I 1-0. June 7, 2002. [needs additional language] **A vote no is a (+).**

(2) 2002 Supplemental Appropriations/ International Criminal Court

Warner, R-VA, motion to table (kill) the Dodd, D-CT, amendment to the Warner amendment. The Dodd amendment would add language to the underlying amendment that would allow the United States to assist the International Criminal Court through Sept. 30, 2002, in cases involving Saddam Hussein, Slobodan

Milosevic, Osama bin Laden, Islamic Jihad, the al-Qaeda terrorist network or any nationals accused of genocide, war crimes or crimes against humanity. The Warner amendment would prohibit U.S. assistance to, or cooperation with, the international court, except to assist or defend U.S. or allied citizens. Motion agreed to 55-40; R 45-2; D 10-37; I 0-1. June 6, 2002. **A vote no is a (+).**

(3) Nuclear Waste Storage/ Yucca Mountain

Murkowski, R-AK, motion to proceed to the joint resolution that would approve a site at Yucca Mountain, Nev., as a repository for the nation's spent nuclear fuel and high-level radioactive waste. Motion agreed to 60-39; R 45-3; D 15-35; I 0-1. July 9, 2002. **A vote no is a (+).**

(4) Use of Force/ Congressional Authority

Byrd, D-WV, amendment to the Lieberman, D-CT, substitute amendment would clarify that

any authorization of the use of force against Iraq would not alter the Constitutional authority of Congress to declare war. It also would clarify that no additional authority not directly related to a clear threat of imminent, sudden and direct attack on the United States be granted to the president unless Congress authorizes it. Rejected 14-86; R 1-48; D 12-38; I 1-0. October 10, 2002. **A vote yes is a (+).**

(5) Use of Force/ Passage

Passage of the joint resolution that would authorize the use of force against Iraq and require the administration to report to Congress that diplomatic options have been exhausted no later than 48 hours after military action has begun. The president also would be required to submit a progress report to Congress at least every 60 days. Passed (thus cleared for the president) 77-23; R 48-1; D 29-21; I 0-1. October 10, 2002. **A vote no is a (+).**

Key House Votes

(1) 2002 Supplemental Appropriations/ Passage

Passage of the bill that would provide \$28.8 billion in supplemental appropriations available for fiscal 2002, more than half of which would go toward military operations. This legislation was a battleground for administration attempts to lift restrictions on the arms trade and military aid. Passed 280-138: R 196-20; D 84-116; I 0-2. May 24, 2002. **A vote no is a (+).**

(2) 2002 Supplemental Appropriations/ Colombian Anti-Drug Activities

McGovern, D-MA/Skelton D-MO, amendment that would strike a provision that would allow Colombian counternarcotics funds to be used for a broader anti-terrorism campaign. Rejected 192-225: R 20-195; D 170-30; I 2-0. May 23, 2002. **A vote yes is a (+).**

(3) Nuclear Waste/ Passage

Passage of the joint resolution that would approve a site at Yucca Mountain, Nev., as a repository for the nation's spent nuclear fuel and high-level radioactive waste. Passed 306-117: R 203-13; D 102-103; I 1-1. May 8, 2002. **A vote no is a (+).**

(4) 2003 Defense Authorization/Motion to Recommit

Spratt, D-SC, motion to recommit the bill to the House Armed Services Committee with instructions to report the bill back with

language that would ban any funds from being spent to develop nuclear-tipped ballistic missile interception. Motion rejected 193-223: R 2-210; D 190-12; I 1-1. May 10, 2002. **A vote yes is a (+).**

(5) 2003 Defense Authorization/International Tribunals

Paul, R-TX, amendment that would ban funds to provide any support for the International Criminal Court. Adopted 264-152: R 204-8; D 59-143; I 1-1. May 10, 2002. **A vote no is a (+).**

(6) 2003 Defense Authorization/Space-Based Missiles

Tierney, D-MA, amendment that would block fiscal 2003 funding for space-based missile defense programs. Rejected 159-253: R 2-206; D 156-46; I 1-1. May 9, 2002. **A vote yes is a (+).**

(7) 2003 Defense Authorization/ Nuclear Penetrator Weapons

Markey, D-MA, amendment that would block fiscal 2003 funding for a study on the nuclear earth-penetrator weapon and prohibit any future funding for such a program. Rejected 172-243: R 4-207; D 167-35; I 1-1. May 9, 2002. **A vote yes is a (+).**

(8) 2003 Defense Authorization/ Nuclear Weapons Development

Weldon, R-PA., amendment that would state the U.S. policy to-

ward Russia on nuclear weapons matters is to pursue cooperation and transparency. It also would repeal the ban on designing and developing low-yield nuclear weapons under certain conditions, including that another nation is conducting nuclear tests or developing nuclear weapons. Adopted 362-53: R 209-1; D 152-51; I 1-1. May 9, 2002. **A vote no is a (+).**

(9) Use of Force/UN Involvement

Lee, D-CA, amendment that would urge the president to work through the United Nations to ensure that Iraq is not developing weapons of mass destruction, and urge the use of peaceful means to resolve the issue, including the resumption of weapons inspections. Rejected 72-355: R 1-219; D 70-136; I 1-0. October 10, 2002. **A vote yes is a (+).**

(10) Use of Force/ Passage

Passage of the joint resolution that would authorize the use of force against Iraq and require the administration to report to Congress that diplomatic options have been exhausted no later than 48 hours after military action has begun. The president also would be required to submit a progress report to Congress at least every 60 days. Passed 296-133: R 215-6; D 81-126; I 0-1. October 10, 2002. **A vote no is a (+).**
